

DRAWING	LEARNING GOAL
Artwork created that is manually drawn on a two dimensional surface.	Create original drawings from observation, visual reference, and imagination. Apply drawing concepts to create contour, gesture, one-point perspective and value blending techniques such as: hatching, cross hatching, stippling.
PAINTING	LEARNING GOAL
Artwork created by applying paint to two- dimensional, three- dimensional surface or using digital media.	Create original paintings demonstrating and identify color theory by mixing tints, shades, and tones using various color schemes (primary/secondary, warm/cool, complimentary, analogous and monochromatic).
PRINTMAKING	LEARNING GOAL
Artwork created by transferring paint/ink from one surface to another.	Investigate and create a cohesive series of relief prints using one or more relief methods (stencil, styrofoam, linoleum, and/or collograph).
MIXED MEDIA	LEARNING GOAL
Artwork made from more then one medium, two-dimensional, three-dimensional and/or digital art medium.	Investigate and design an original work of art using layering techniques, integrating at least 3 different types of media into a collage.
SCULPTURE	LEARNING GOAL
Artwork that is three-dimensional and can be made from an array of materials.	Investigate the concept of form, space, and balance by creating an original relief and/or free-standing sculpture using additive and/or subtractive methods.
CERAMICS	LEARNING GOAL
Artwork made from clay.	Investigate and create a functional or non-funtional ceramic piece using correct handbuilding techniques (pinch, coil, slab, slip and score), as well as, understand the different surface and structural qualities of clay.

Students will also be participating in art shows, contests, and exhibitions here at the school and in the community. They will be on display to celebrate their hard work and reward original thought, problem solving, and critical thinking skills.

MAKE UP WORK

The student has one school day to make up work for each school day excused absence (day for a day). For example, the student is out for 4 school days then the student has 4 school days to turn in the makeup work. Work can be made up for excused absences, out-of-school suspension, religious holidays, and excused tardies.

Students should use the extra copies bin and assignment calendar in the classroom to find missing work/ make up work.

Planned trips and holidays may not apply—try to do make up work BEFORE your trip. Remember to email the principal for approval of trips.

Parents may call the front desk to request make up work for any absences over two days.

Long term projects and tests scheduled before the absence do NOT apply. Students will sit for a test the day that they return.

LATE WORK

Students must turn in work when it is due so that they do not lose points.

Late work will lose 10% each day that it is late.

Long-term Projects will receive harsher penalties for tardiness. They will be accepted, however, for at least a 50% before the quarter ends.


